As I write, I have just finished presiding over the memorial for Charles Husum. Charles was 103 years old when he entered into everlasting life. His obituary - published in our bulletin and in the newspaper - says that Charles was "a believer in lifetime learning; he was always interested in people ... and enjoyed hearing of their activities and accomplishments." By many standards, Charles was a brilliant man: he has seven engineering patents attached to his name. What set Charles apart, however, was not his accomplishments in the laboratory, it was his sense of lifelong learning and interest in people.

Charles' obituary has reminded me of a conversation with a Christian friend of our church a few days before the funeral. Our continued on next page

friend explained that his job requires him to talk with gang members. One particular gang claims that they believe in the Norse god Thor. Rather than be intimidated by this gang, **our friend teaches them out of lifelong learning about the Triune God of hope and forgiveness**.

These stories get me to thinking about our Lutheran heritage. This month, Lutherans around the world begin a year-long observance of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. The Reformation was begun by another brilliant man who also believed in lifelong learning and had an interest in people. Martin Luther kick started a movement that changed the way Christians looked at Jesus and the Bible. He also **changed the ways Christians should think about education**.

Martin Luther's significant contribution to Christian education was the publication of the Small and the Large Catechisms. He believed that **Christian education should be carried out by parents to children**. The **role of the church is to help parents teach and reinforce the principles of the faith**. Thus, the Small Catechism was to be used by parents at home; the Large Catechism to be used by pastors to teach adults of all households.

Martin Luther was particularly passionate about **quality of education both in church and in society**. Luther was fiery with energy and could wear his thoughts on his sleeve. So stunned by the lack of Christian knowledge among his German neighbors, Luther wrote strong words to the German churches in the introduction to The Small Catechism, wagging his finger: "The common people ... have no knowledge whatever of Christian teaching ... they live as if they were pigs and irrational beasts. How will you bishops answer for it before Christ that you have so shamefully neglected the people and paid no attention at all to the duties of your office? May you escape judgement for this!" ("The Small Catechism", *The Book of Concord*, Tappert translation, 1959) Martin Luther's tough language reflected his belief that **education is a commandment of God** begun through Moses. The Devil's job, Luther thought, is to persuade us that education is not important.

Philip Melanchthon (Mel - ANCK - thon) was a student of Martin Luther. In his time, Melanchthon was called the "professor of Germany". He believed that **education is both a lifelong right and a responsibility in society**. Because of Melanchthon, German girls were given their own schools for education; communities organized schools that today we call "high school"; and education programs were created to encourage both youth and adults to learn mathematics, literature, debate, philosophy, and Bible history.

A great response to the question "What is a Lutheran" is "we believe in education". We learn from others and we teach others our whole lives long.

These days, most studies of Christian education show that **Bible study and worship participation** is as critically low among adults as it is among youth. Most research on Bible study tells us that less than half of all Christians participate in any kind of Biblical discussion or group Bible study even on the internet. It is my hunch that, when we stop making Bible study with one another a top priority, the world beyond our church building learns from us and says the Word of God is unimportant, too.


PASTOR'S THOUGHTS

One great and glorious gift of God that Lutherans have brought to history is our intense focus on Christian education for all people, not just our children. Like Charles Husum, we believe in lifelong education - a "renewing of the mind" for the sake of Christ and of one another. In the words of our mission statement at Holy Trinity, we are called to "teach and live the Word of God." Ways that we can follow through on our mission promises include Sunday school and Bible studies at church, but also small group Bible studies in our homes and public studies in cafés and restaurants. We have nearby congregations whose members have the same questions of faith as you and I do. I have even participated in a Bible study cruise – morning Bible study and afternoon sightseeing on a cruise ship!

As we Lutherans enter into our year-long reflections on the Reformation, perhaps we at Holy Trinity might commit to Bible study together. **Our mission field begins with one another and extends beyond to our neighbors as well**.

Our Tuesday evening men's and women's book studies will begin on October 4th at 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. Both groups will be studying "Creating"



THE PRESIDENT'S PEN

On September 8, I had the opportunity to speak to our Seniors group about the call process. I appreciated the attentive audience and their many thoughtful questions. To be honest, it was difficult for me to stay focused on my presentation – I could smell Martha Everhart's wonderful lasagna baking in the kitchen!





In the Bible, you find many examples of God calling persons to serve him. Lutherans believe that God calls certain individuals to serve as ordained ministers of Word and Sacrament. One such person is Matt Wheeler, a son of our congregation who now is serving as pastor of First Lutheran Church in Galion, Ohio. As is the case for all seminary graduates, Matt was not ordained until he received a call from a church.

In Lutheran theology, we believe that God controls the call process of a pastor. The congregation discerns God's will through prayer, interviews and a vote of the congregation.

In the "real" or secular world, businesses and organizations recruit and interview prospective employees, select the most promising candidates, and fire them if they don't meet expectations. The call process is much more like a courtship – a courtship which hopefully leads to a long-term relationship. This is a special courtship because it is led by the Holy Spirit. It is God's process, and it proceeds at whatever speed God intends. Since we live in a world where we want everything done immediately (if not sooner), some people find waiting for God to be a frustrating experience.

I'd like to explain some of the mechanics of the call process. Pastors and seminary graduates who are interested in a call complete a **Rostered Leader Profile**, a lengthy document in which he or she talks about their education, experience, and ministry interests. This profile, also known as a pastor's "mobility papers," is submitted to the ELCA's national office in Chicago. The pastor lists all of the synods (Northwestern Ohio and Southeastern Michigan, for example) to which he or she wants the mobility papers forwarded.

Our congregation has submitted a **Ministry Site Profile** with information about Holy Trinity and the Toledo area. It was written for a national audience; that is, it describes our congregation and community to pastors who may be unfamiliar with our part of the country. The Ministry Site Profile provides historic and demographic information. More importantly, it gives information about our current ministry and our future ministry goals.

TONY'S THOUGHTS CONT'D

The next step in the call process is for the Northwestern Ohio Synod staff to review the mobility papers it has received from pastors. These mobility papers will be compared with Holy Trinity's profile. The synod will forward to our call committee the mobility papers of pastors who appear to be a match for our congregation's profile. Pastors interested in a call in northwestern Ohio will review the profile of our congregation.

If the call committee wants to learn more about a pastor, it will schedule one or more interviews. The committee may inform a candidate that it feels he or she does not meet the needs of our congregation. Or, a pastor may decide that Holy Trinity would be better served by someone else. The process continues until the call committee recommends that a candidate be interviewed by church council. The candidate may also be invited for a "meet and greet" with the congregation.

The final step in the process is for the congregation to vote on whether to extend a call to a pastor. If the congregation votes to extend a call and it is accepted, details regarding compensation, benefits and other matters are negotiated. The call committee's task is completed when – and not until – the new pastor is installed.


